DRIVING CHANGE AND EMPOWERMENT

In an exclusive interview with THE VOICE, the Ministry of Gender Equality, Poverty Eradication and Social Welfare (MGEPESW) Executive Director Ms. Ndiitah Nghipondoka-Robiati shares her vision for driving meaningful change ranging from breaking down gender barriers to combating poverty.

Below, she discusses her overarching vision, strategies for integrating gender perspectives into national policies, and plans to support the nation's most vulnerable.

What is your overarching vision for the Ministry during your tenure?

To foster an inclusive and equitable society where every individual, regardless of gender or socioeconomic status, has access to opportunities, resources and support systems necessary for their empowerment and well-being.

This involves advancing gender equality through policies and programmes that dismantle systemic barriers, ensuring the eradication of poverty by promoting sustainable economic opportunities, and strengthening social welfare systems to protect and uplift the most vulnerable populations.

My goal is to create a legacy of empowerment, resilience, and fairness that transforms lives and supports national development.

How will you ensure the integration of gender perspectives into national policies across all sectors?

Namibian has adopted Gender Responsive Budgeting (GRB) as a tool to integrate gender perspectives into national policies. To ensure its effectiveness, it is crucial to continue building capacity within all Government institutions.

This include the usage of gender-disaggregated data to guide budget decisions. Coordination across ministries and active participation from civil society, especially women's groups, will strengthen GRB's impact.

Monitoring and evaluation mechanisms are essential to track progress and make adjustments as needed. Political commitment is key to ensuring GRB remains a sustainable and transformative practice in Namibia.

What plans do you have to combat Gender-Based Violence (GBV) and support survivors?

To combat GBV and support survivors, I plan to continue with the implementation for prevention initiatives. This includes continued capacity building with all stakeholders, improve data collection.

How do you plan to engage the staff members and public at large to advance the Ministry's objectives?

It is important to foster a collaborative workplace culture through clear communication, capacity building and recognition of staff contributions.

For the public, we continue to promote awareness campaigns, community dialogues and partnerships with civil society to encourage active participation. Additionally, I will ensure transparency and accessibility in the Ministry's programmes to build trust and strengthen collective efforts.

What leadership principles guide you, and how will they influence your work in this role?

My leadership is guided by principles of inclusivity, accountability and collaboration. I value transparency and ethical decision-making, fostering trust and empowerment among my team and stakeholders. These principles will drive my efforts to create inclusive policies, ensure effective programme implementation and build partnerships that advance gender equality, poverty eradication, and social welfare goals.

How has your first 30 days in office been?

My first 30 days in office have been insightful and productive. I focused on understanding the Ministry's operations, engaging with staff and meeting key stakeholders. This period has provided a clear perspective on the challenges and opportunities ahead, laying a strong foundation for advancing the Ministry's objectives.

WOMEN IN BUSINESS ASSOCIATION EXPANDS TO KUNENE REGION



KUNENE – The Ministry has expanded its Women in Business Association (WBA) platform to the Kunene Region, becoming the sixth region to establish a Regional WBA committee.

The WBA provides women entrepreneurs with opportunities to network, share resources, and access mentoring. It aims to enhance access to financing, market linkages, and value addition for their products and services.

A two-day seminar in Kunene brought together WBA members from all seven constituencies and 34 participants, including stakeholders from the Ministry of Industrialisation, NAMRA, and the Kunene Regional Council. These stakeholders shared insights on supporting women entrepreneurs.

Hon. Bernadette Jagger, Deputy Minister of MGEPESW, urged women to showcase their achievements through trade fairs. "Women are not here to compete with men but to show them what we can achieve," she said.

The seminar ended with the formal establishment of Kunene's Regional WBA Committee, advancing the empowerment of women entrepreneurs in Namibia.

WINDHOEK – The Ministry of Gender Equality, Poverty Eradication, and Social Welfare officially launched the annual 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence (GBV) campaign on November 25, 2024, at the UN Plaza Amphitheatre in Windhoek.

Themed "Towards Beijing 30+: Unite! to End Violence Against Women & Girls," the campaign underscores the urgent need to combat the rising prevalence of GBV and promote collective action to protect women and girls.

Speaking on behalf of Hon. Doreen Sioka, Minister of Gender Equality, Poverty Eradication, and Social Welfare, Hon. Yvonne Dauseb, Minister of Justice, highlighted sobering statistics. Referring to the 2013 Demographic Health Survey, she noted a GBV prevalence rate of 33% in Namibia and revealed that 4,814 GBV cases were reported nationwide during the 2023/24 financial year.

"Today, as we stand united in the call to eliminate all forms of violence against women and girls,

I want to inform you that the Government and stakeholders have taken necessary measures to address this crisis through the implementation of the Prioritised National Plan of Action on GBV 2019-2023," Hon. Dauseb stated. She emphasised the importance of collaboration among government institutions, civil society, NGOs, academia, and faith-based organizations.

However, she expressed deep concern over the increase in child sexual abuse, often committed by trusted individuals such as relatives and caregivers.

The 16 Days of Activism campaign featured nationwide activities from November 25 to December 10, including the 4th National Men's Conference in Rundu, dialogues with traditional and religious leaders, community workshops, and concluded with the commemoration of International Human Rights Day and Namibian Women's Day in Outapi, Omusati Region.

The campaign serves as a reminder of the collective responsibility to fight GBV and create a safer environment for all Namibians.

RIGHTS AND RESILIENCE

Poverty Eradication and Social Welfare

OUTAPI – The Ministry commemorated the International Human Rights Day and the Namibian Women's Day on 10 December 2024, with a significant event held in Outapi, Omusati Region.

The occasion honoured the Universal Declaration of Human Rights adopted in 1948 and celebrated the bravery of Namibian women, particularly Madam Anna 'Kakurukaze' Mungunda, who stood against the forced removals of residents from Windhoek's Old Location to Katutura on 10 December 1959.

Under the theme "Our Rights, Our Future, Right Now," the event emphasised human rights as a transformative force for dignity, justice, and equality. It also underscored the need to address current injustices while driving meaningful social change to empower marginalized groups.

Hon. Doreen Sioka, Minister of Gender Equality, Poverty Eradication, and Social Welfare, officiated the event, highlighting Namibia's commitment to human rights.

She noted the achievements enshrined in Article 5 of the Namibian Constitution, which protects freedoms. fundamental and the country's establishment of institutions like the Ombudsman and the Legal Assistance Centre to uphold these rights.

In her address, Hon. Sioka celebrated Namibia's progress in gender equality, with the country achieving an 80.5% gender gap closure, ranking 8th globally and 1st in Sub-Saharan Africa in 2024. "These achievements reflect advancements in economic education. participation, political empowerment, and health," she said.

The day's objectives included promoting human awareness, condemning gender-based violence, and encouraging men and boys to play active roles in combating GBV. Hon. Sioka reminded Namibians of the sacrifices made for peace and urged continued efforts to honour those who fought for justice.

The event served as a reminder of Namibia's commitment to equality and justice, celebrating past struggles while striving for a brighter, more inclusive future.

On December 10, Hon. The booklet highlights vital initiatives such as grants for vulnerable households, support for orphans and vulnerable children, disability grants, and other services designed to improve the lives of those in need.

By bridging the information gap, the booklet ensures that all citizens can access crucial details about available support. Hon. Sioka emphasized the need for widespread distribution, urging stakeholders to ensure the booklet reaches every corner of the country.

The Ministry of Gender Equality, Poverty Eradication and Social Welfare was honoured to participate in the UN-organized men's cook-off competition on 22 November as part of the activities leading up to the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence, which was launched on November 25 at the UN Plaza.

This event not only highlighted culinary skills but also underscored our shared commitment to raising awareness about GBV and fostering a culture of respect and equality. By coming together, we can ignite important conversations and inspire meaningful action to end violence against women and girls.



FOOTBALL



WINDHOEK – The Ministry of Gender Equality, Poverty Eradication, and Social Welfare partnered with the Namibia Football Association (NFA) and United Nations Namibia to host a Mini Football Tournament on 7 December 2024 as part of the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence.

The event featured eight teams, including representatives from the Ministry, the UN, local banks, and media houses. In a thrilling final, the Media Team edged out Standard Bank 5-4 in a penalty shootout to claim victory.

The Ministry highlighted the importance of sports in raising awareness about GBV and fostering community engagement. The NFA pledged to incorporate GBV awareness into its annual training programs, ensuring the message extends beyond the field.

The tournament, supported by UNFPA, NAMDEB, and other sponsors, underscored the power of collective action in combating GBV.

INTERGENERATIONAL DIALOGUE

Regain Trust, in partnership with the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), the Franco Namibian Cultural Centre (FNCC), and the Ministry of Gender Equality, Poverty Eradication and Social Welfare, hosted an Intergenerational Dialogue on 5 December, as part of the global 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence (GBV) campaign.

This year's theme, "UNITE! Invest to Prevent Violence Against Women and Girls," underscores the urgent need for collective investment in preventing GBV and promoting gender equality.



The dialogue aimed at fostering open, collaborative prevention strategies between adolescents, young people, and their parents/guardians to bridge the gaps left by isolated GBV prevention engagement models.

INCLUSIVITY FOR A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

LÜDERITZ – The International Day of Persons with Disabilities was commemorated on 3 December 2024 in Lüderitz, //Kharas Region, under the theme "Amplifying the Leadership of Persons with Disabilities for an Inclusive and Sustainable Future."

The event highlighted the importance of empowering persons with disabilities to lead and contribute meaningfully to all sectors of society.

Delivering the keynote address, Hon. Alexia Manombe-Ncube, Deputy Minister of Disability Affairs, emphasised the need for accessibility, education, and mentorship to ensure the inclusion of persons with disabilities in leadership roles.

She acknowledged Namibia's progress, citing the National Disability Policy of 1997 and the ratification of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities in 2007. However, the Deputy Minister pointed out the gap between policy and implementation, calling for collective

efforts to address barriers that limit the participation of persons with disabilities. "We must create environments where everyone can thrive, ensuring accessibility in physical spaces, education, and leadership," she said.

Drawing from her personal journey, she encouraged attendees to challenge stereotypes and take active roles in advocating for inclusivity. She praised organizations like the Namibia Organization of Youth with Disabilities for nurturing leadership and urged local disability leaders to engage with regional leadership to amplify their voices.

The event underscored Namibia's commitment to creating a more inclusive society while also recognising the challenges ahead. "Leadership is about influencing others.

Let us work together to make Namibia truly inclusive," she concluded. The day ended with renewed calls for action to bridge the gap between disability policies and their implementation.



The Ministry of Gender Equality, Poverty Eradication, and Social Welfare hosted the 4th National Men's Conference in Rundu, Kavango East Region, under the theme "Redefining Masculinity: A Holistic Approach to Well-being."

Drawing over 800 men from diverse backgrounds, the conference aimed to reshape societal perceptions of masculinity by promoting empathy and emotional intelligence as strengths rather than weaknesses.

A Platform for Change

The conference served as a pivotal platform for men to engage in meaningful discussions about the challenges they face and the societal expectations surrounding masculinity. Key objectives included addressing issues such as gender-based violence (GBV), promoting positive gender norms, and equipping men with non-violent conflict resolution skills.

Tackling the Roots of GBV

A presentation by the Namibian Police's Gender-Based Violence Protection Unit (NAMPOL/GBVPU) for the Kavango East Region highlighted the alarming rates of domestic violence and rape in the area. The session shed light on the need for collective action and provided recommendations:

• Collaboration: More stakeholders must unite to combat GBV effectively.

- Community Engagement: Church leaders should create activities to educate youth on the dangers of alcohol and drug abuse from a spiritual perspective.
- Parental Guidance: Parents must instill moral education in children, emphasizing that education starts at home.

Promoting Positive Masculinity

Participants were encouraged to redefine masculinity by embracing alternative approaches to conflict resolution, becoming advocates for healthier lifestyles, and actively standing against GBV.

The event emphasized the importance of men taking ownership of their roles as leaders and change agents within their communities.

Moving Forward

The conference underscored the Ministry's commitment to fostering positive masculinity and breaking harmful stereotypes. By equipping men with knowledge and skills, the event aimed to inspire long-term change that would benefit not only men but also their families and communities.

As the 4th National Men's Conference concluded, the conversations ignited in Rundu offered hope for a future where masculinity is redefined to prioritize empathy, emotional well-being, and mutual respect.

BUILDING BRIDGES

The Northern Disability Information Sharing Seminar, held on 8 November 2024 at the ELCIN Hall in Oshakati, brought together representatives from five regions under the theme "To Do Right Needs Enlightenment."

The event highlighted the need for collaboration and leadership to address the challenges faced by persons with disabilities in Namibia. Hon. Alexia Manombe-Ncube, Deputy Minister of Disability Affairs, encouraged persons with disabilities to be both voters and candidates, emphasizing, "True inclusion means self-representation at all levels of society." She also stressed the importance of mentorship, urging leaders to inspire the next generation to rise above limitations.

She further emphasised the importance of collective efforts to dismantle barriers and foster inclusion, highlighting government initiatives like the EntreprenHER program and Income Generation Projects as tools to empower individuals.

Closing with a message of empowerment, she quoted global peace activist Thich Nhat Hanh: "The well is inside you." The seminar was not just an event but a movement to ignite enlightenment and inclusion across Namibia, setting a blueprint for a future where no one is left behind.

The seminar showcased the interconnected nature of disability issues, with contributions from various ministries and the Namibian Federation of People with Disabilities Network (NFPDN), highlighting the power of community-led initiatives in driving change.

DIGITAL LITERACY

WINDHOEK – Women micro-entrepreneurs from diverse sectors participated in a transformative digital literacy training from 5 to 8 November 2024.

The training aimed to equip women in the informal sector with essential digital skills to grow their businesses. Participants included hairdressers, tailors, caterers, and street vendors. Sessions focused on using digital tools, e-commerce platforms, online payment systems and digital marketing strategies.



The four-day training was attended by 27 women who noted the immense potential of digital skills in breaking geographical barriers and accessing new markets.

CONDITIONAL BASIC INCOME GRANT

Ms. Ndiitah Nghipondoka-Robiati (ED MGEPESW): In an exclusive interview with NBC, Executive Director of the Ministry of Gender Equality, Poverty Eradication and Social Welfare, Ms. Ndiitah Nghipondoka-Robiati, outlined the significance and objectives of the newly launched Conditional Basic Income Grant (CBIG).

She explained that the monthly cash payment of N\$600 is a key component of the Ministry's strategy to move away from the Food Bank Programme and the Special Feeding for Marginalised Communities Programme.

According to Ms. Nghipondoka-Robiati, the CBIG aims to provide immediate financial relief to vulnerable and destitute residents across urban and semi-urban areas, ensuring they have access to basic necessities and an improved quality of life.

Launched on 13 November 2024, the initiative involves a comprehensive roll-out process that includes registration, re-registration, verification, and validation of beneficiaries.

The Ministry has enlisted the support of regional councils, local authorities and other stakeholders to ensure the grant reaches those most in need effectively.

Ms. Nghipondoka-Robiati emphasized the collaborative effort required to make the program a success, stating, "Our goal is not only to provide immediate relief but to build a more inclusive social protection system for all Namibians, ensuring that no one is left behind."

Looking ahead, the Ministry plans to continually review and improve the CBIG to expand its coverage and impact, integrating it into a broader social protection strategy that includes education, health and employment opportunities.

A GIFT OF SUPPORT

On 12 December 2024, Hon. Doreen Sioka visited the Oukwanyama Royal House of Queen Martha Mwadinomho Nelumbu, where she generously donated food supplies to support the 18 orphans and vulnerable children residing there.

During the visit, Queen Martha expressed her sincere gratitude for the kind gesture and highlighted the ongoing challenges the children face, particularly in accessing education.

She thanked the Ministry for their support and appealed to other stakeholders to join hands in building the a bright future for the Namibian Children.

Queen Nelumbu emphasized the urgent need for a primary school closer to the royal palace to reduce the long distances children must travel to attend school. The nearest school presents significant challenges, especially during the rainy season when travel becomes even more difficult.

Currently, the children attend the ECD Centre at Omhedi Royal Palace, but the need for a primary school in the area is critical to ensure they can continue their education without interruption.

EMPOWERING TEAMWORK

Following the commemoration of International Human Rights Day and Namibian Women's Day in the Omusati Region, 10 December, Hon. Doreen Sioka met with staff alongside Ms. Ndiitah Nghipondoka-Robiati.

During the meeting, Hon. Sioka emphasized the importance of teamwork in executing the Ministry's mandate and encouraged employees to embrace their roles with passion, maintain punctuality, and serve the community diligently.

She also introduced Ms. Nghipondoka-Robiati, who assumed office as Executive Director on 1 November 2024.

Ms. Nghipondoka-Robiati expressed her pleasure in meeting the regional staff and stressed the need to acknowledge Namibia's global competitiveness, urging staff to rethink strategies and address underlying issues that may hinder service delivery for greater efficiency.

Staff members shared their work highlights, challenges, and key achievements, affirming their readiness to serve in alignment with the Ministry's mandate and core values.

CONNECT, SHARE AND BUILD

The Directorate of Gender Equality, Child Care and Protection hosted a two-day debriefing workshop for 34 staff members from the After School Centres and Namibia Children's Home.

The workshop, held on 12-13 December 2024, at the Avani Hotel in Windhoek, served as a platform for staff to connect, share experiences and strengthen their support network.

Acknowledging the vital role these staff members play in the daily care and development of abandoned and vulnerable children, the workshop emphasized wellness and professional growth. Key sessions focused on managing stress and burnout, emotional healing, conflict resolution and effective communication.

The blend of education and enjoyment at the workshop underscored the Ministry's dedication to supporting those who dedicate their lives to caring for vulnerable children.

Participants reported that the debriefing workshop came at an opportune time and reignited their dedication to spending quality time with the children they care for and deepened their sense of family connection with them.

CELEBRATING DIVERSITY AND CULTURE



On 26 November 2024, the children at the Namibia Children's Home celebrated the diversity of Namibian cultures. The caretakers showcased and explained various traditions, emphasizing the importance of upholding and respecting their heritage. The children wore traditional attire and proudly displayed their dances and food. The Namibia Children's Home serves as a sanctuary for vulnerable children.

THE JOURNEY FROM "UNDER THE TREE" TO A "FIVE-STAR CLASSROOM"

Imagine attending preschool, enduring heat and rain under a tree, or sharing a single classroom with over 50 preschoolers. Now, picture sitting on a comfortable chair at a desk, surrounded by toys, and watching cartoons on a big-screen television. This is not a dream but the new reality for pre-schoolers at Farm Six and Brayo ECD Centre.

The Ministry, in collaboration with Palms for Life Fund Namibia, inaugurated and handed over two newly constructed Early Childhood Development (ECD) Centres on 25 October 2024 at Farm Six in the Oshikoto Region and on 30 October 2024 at Bravo in the Kavango West Region.

The centres feature fully equipped classrooms, an office, a storeroom, and a kitchen, along with child-friendly ablutions. They are furnished with furniture, appliances, books, toys and electricity. Each facility accommodates more than 100 children, providing access to age-appropriate education and stimulation.

Additionally, six teachers are currently being trained through the Montessori teacher training program. The ECD centres will also provide daily meals for all children and their caretakers.

During the inauguration, Hon. Royal /Ui/o/oo, Deputy Minister for Marginalised Communities, expressed his gratitude to Palms for Life for its commitment to improving the lives of Marginalised Communities.

I trust that we will continue to strengthen our partnership, and that this relationship will encourage similar strategic collaborations with other partners as well. May these centres serve as a beacon of hope for the future of our children and our communities at large," he noted.

The construction and equipping of these centres amounted to N\$11,100,000, with Bravo costing N\$5,300,000 and Farm Six N\$5,800,000. The state-of-the-art facilities are designed to provide quality early childhood education and resources, ensuring that every child has access to a nurturing and supportive learning environment.

WORLD AIDSDAY

2024 Theme: "Take the Rights Path: My Health, My Right!"





The Ministry commemorated World AIDS Day on 1 December, a day dedicated to honouring the memory of those who have lost their lives to HIV/AIDS and offering support to those living with the virus and managing it with ongoing medical care. This year's observance focused on the vital call to break the stigma surrounding HIV/AIDS and promote understanding and acceptance.

In a show of solidarity, staff members were green and red, colors symbolizing the fight against HIV/AIDS, as a visual reminder of their collective commitment to this cause. In the dusty fields of Corridor 13, where the sun blazed down and hope shimmered like a mirage, children from Namibia's marginalized communities gathered to compete, connect, and dream during the 2024 Dr. Libertine Amathila Sports Tournament (Dr. LAST).

From 2 to 6 December, the grounds of Motsomi Constituency Primary School in **Aminuis** transformed into an arena of possibility, where footballs and netballs carried more than the weight of competition, they carried stories of resilience, unity and ambition.

This annual event, named after the trailblazing Dr. Libertine Amathila, celebrates the strength and potential of Namibia's Indigenous youth. Against the backdrop of struggle and marginalization, the tournament stands as a testament to what can be achieved when opportunity and determination collide.

The Deputy Minister of Marginalized Communities, speaking at the opening ceremony, captured the spirit of the event: "Sport is more than a game; it's a voice. It amplifies the stories of those who are often overlooked, celebrating cultures, languages, and identities while tackling global issues of discrimination, exclusion and inequality."

The tournament is an invaluable vehicle for raising awareness of issues affecting Indigenous minorities and marginalized communities in Namibia."

Since its inception in 2014, it has rotated across various regions. This year, it attracted over 368 participants from Kavango East, Kavango West, Kunene, Ohangwena, Omaheke, Omusati, Oshana, Oshikoto, Otjozondjupa and Zambezi regions.

The tournament's football competition saw Kunene Region emerge as champions, winning the floating trophy, gold medals, and a cash prize of N\$10,000. Ohangwena Region secured second place with silver medals and N\$7,000, while Zambezi Region claimed third place with bronze medals and N\$3,000. All three winning teams also received brand-new kits.

In netball, Kunene Region once again clinched the trophy and a cash prize of N\$6,500. Otjozondjupa Region-A came in second with N\$5,000, followed by Otjozondjupa Region-B in third place, taking home N\$3,000.

tournament was a resounding success. showcasing not only the athletic talents of the participants but also the cultural richness and resilience of Namibia's marginalized communities. As the event concluded, excitement is already building for year's edition, promising yet unforgettable celebration of sportsmanship and unity.
